Talk to various staff members and they will tell you about our new assistant principal who is full of energy, positive and optimistic, student centered, but also mindful of the teachers and staff and what they need to be effective on a daily basis.

I have the benefit of being able to talk to Zack most days of the week - despite the fact that his "to do" list grows by the minute - and am always invigorated by our conversations. He displays passion, compassion, curiosity, creativity, and a collaborative spirit, almost every time we talk.

I recently asked Zack to look into the possibility of inviting representatives from Historically Black Colleges and Universities to come and talk to our students about their plans for college. He met with Mr. Myers, our counselor responsible for college visits, and together they extended invitations to Central State and Wilberforce colleges. Additionally, they decided that they would like for the HBCU representatives to have a more public and prominent presence, so that more students can be exposed to the experience - motivated in part by the philosophy of "you can't be what you can't see."

I heard from a colleague who said that Mr. Cline stopped in to see her, unexpectedly, to thank her for the extra time she spent working with a challenging student on his academics and his academic plan for the remainder of his high school career. Though Mr. Cline's visit and words were brief, I got the impression that the teacher was very appreciative of his effort and impacted by his words, which made her feel more valued as an educator and an important part of the building and the educational process.

I am so thankful and excited that we have Mr. Cline in our building and I hope that he remains in Miamisburg for the remainder of his career. He is undoubtedly making a difference at the high school and the district, just as he had as a classroom teacher.
